

THE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The scholarship was established by the terms of the sale of the Nokomis Library-Clubhouse to the Chamber of Commerce in 1972. The Nokomis Club appointed a Scholarship Committee beginning in 1975 that determined the criteria a recipient is required to meet, and evaluates the applications submitted. The Scholarship Committee is assisted by the high school Career Counselor who advises students on their career plans, and acts as a liaison between the club and interested high school students. The Career Counselor also publicizes the scholarship to those students who have the potential to meet the scholarship requirements so they may submit an application.

Only applicants who are graduating seniors from Redmond High School are eligible for consideration for the scholarship. Factors considered by the Scholarship Committee include parental occupations, the number of siblings in the family, and whether a sibling is currently attending college. The college where the applicant intends to matriculate, the potential area of study, and the current class rank provide further information. The applicant must also attach a résumé that includes high school activities and interests, community activities, work experience, and achievements, awards, and honors. In addition the applicant is required to submit an essay that describes their reasons for deciding to pursue an education beyond high school.

The availability of this scholarship has been very significant to the recipients, and several of the winners have responded with inspirational letters to the club. Recipients have commented that the scholarship award provided the opportunity that made a higher education possible.

In order for the scholarship fund to become viable, the Chamber contributed \$300 each year for 15 years into the fund to ensure a scholarship would be awarded. During the ensuing years, substantial donations including one of \$10,000 have increased the scholarship monies. Two major fundraising events—the raffle of a quilt handmade by Nokomis members in 1985 and raffle of a Christmas Gift Basket in 2009—made significant contributions to the fund.

RECENT GRADUATE OF REDMOND HIGH SCHOOL

Nokomis Club honors city's finest, regardless of age

On Friday, June 29, the women of Redmond's Nokomis Club shared lunch at the Family Pancake House, awarded its annual college scholarship, honored one of its oldest members for volunteer service and began planning for a 100-year anniversary celebration in 2009.

If that seems like an awful lot to pack into one meeting, you probably don't know the history of this sisterhood of movers and shakers.

A touching poem by Eileen McCoskrie, circulated at the June meeting, gives a clue about the origins of the group that formed during pioneer days and opened Redmond's first public library in 1927.

In part, the poem reads:

"A diverse club that met each month on a Friday noon

Meant a stolen hour from solemn duties At washboards, treadle sewing machines, wood-burning stoves,

Feeding chickens, children and hungry

It meant an hour to talk and laugh, to exchange ideas.

At least the ideas women were allowed

And don't forget—to do good works

The entire poem and other memorabilia will be featured in a commemorative booklet for the club's centennenial, and the Nokomis Club is collaborating with

the turn-of-the-century.

At least one Nokomis member, Audrey Gorlick, could actually tell you what life was like when Redmond was a rough-and-tumble logging and farming town. She's 102 years old and a recent recipient of the President's Volunteer Service Award.

Yet the ladies of Nokomis don't just live in the past. One of the ways they look to the future is by giving scholarships to ambitious high school graduates.

This year's \$1,000 recipient was Redmond High School's Sean Tennis. A Running Start student, football and trumpet player among other things, his culminating project was remodeling his parents' bathroom.

He also has his own pressure-washing and landscaping business, which he'll hand down to his brother when he heads off to Whitworth College this fall.

A \$10,000 donation from Gorlick's nephew, Richard Hirsch, made Tennis' scholarship possible and will help the Nokomis women send other young people to college for several years to come.

But the club can use some support from the community as it strives to install the bench or statue at the Redmond Regional Library in 2009.

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Nokomis: 100 years of service

Pioneer women's club established Redmond's first library in 1927

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Redmond's Nokomis Club celebrated its centennial year in 2009.

Established in 1909 as an organization of pioneer women, Nokomis was named for a figure in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's "The Song of Hiawatha."

The ladies of Nokomis promoted reading and education and established Redmond's first public library in 1927. They continued to fund and operate the library until it became part of the King County Library System (KCLS) in 1947.

Since the 1950s, the group has awarded an annual scholarship to a Redmond high school senior. Recently, Nokomis members raised \$1,090 for the next Audrey Gorlick Memorial Scholarship, to be given at the end of this academic year to a graduate heading to college or a technical school.

Gorlick was a longtime Nokomis member who was profiled in the July 19, 2008 edition of the Redmond Reporter, shortly after she passed away at the age of 103.

For the most recent scholar-

ship fundraising campaign, Nokomis member Sharon Daley spearheaded an effort to involve Redmond businesses. Accents Etcetera fashioned a gift basket including donations from 21 Redmond businesses and totaling \$874.50 in merchandise. KidsArt also donated a \$146 scholarship.

QFC Bella Bottega allowed Nokomis members Judy Lang and Marge Hanson to sell \$550 worth of raffle tickets outside the store. QFC employee Eric Sadlier was the lucky winner of the gift basket.

Visitors to the present-day Redmond Regional Library, 15990 NE 85th St., can view a special piece of fused-glass art called "Women of Vision," presented to the KCLS by Nokomis on March 7, 2009. The art adorns the lobby of the library as a reminder of some of Redmond's first true champions of knowledge.
