<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>Ed. Note: The Industrial Home in Des Moines was a private facility owned and operated by Herman and Annie Draper who provided a loving and educational environment for homeless and abandoned children from 1908 to 1927. Thirty-six children could be housed at once in the 3-story 28-room former Hiatt Hotel on the corner of South 220th and 6th Ave South. Mr. Draper developed a method of teaching music, and each child was taught both vocal and instrumental music. In addition each child received an academic public education, and was trained in a trade—either in the print shop on the grounds or in stagecraft and performance. The children toured the United States performing concerts in order to raise money for the home. (Des Moines Historical Society, Internet, 2011)</i>

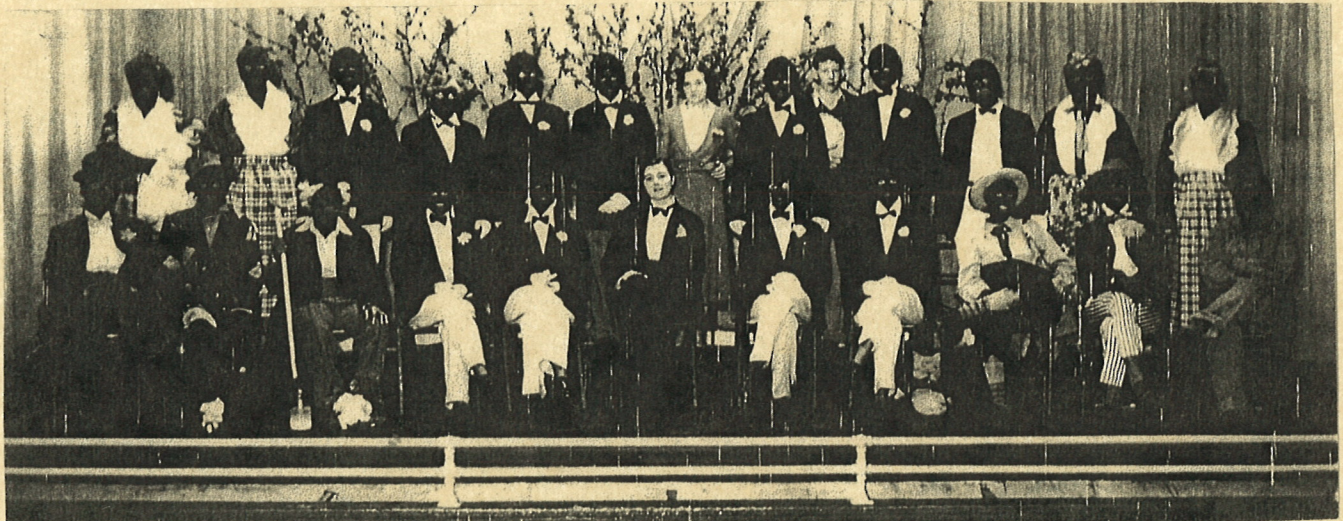

Parents perspired.

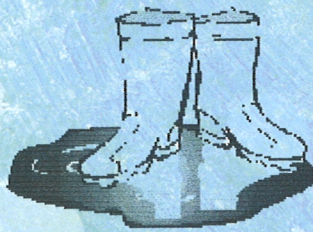


Perforce, pleasure bent people perambulated pell-mell popular pavilion to pacify poignant pangs.
